A Little Mother's Day History. Anna Jarvis held a memorial service to honor her late mother on May 12, 1907 at her mother's church in Grafton, West Virginia. Anna's mother had organized women's groups to promote friendship and health. Within 5 years virtually every state was observing the day and in 1914 US. President Woodrow Wilson made it a national holiday. Over time the day was expanded to include grandmothers, aunts, and other women in our lives who also provided mothering roles in our lives. The Day of Pentecost A little more History this is from, calendar.lcms.org What Is Pentecost? The word "Pentecost comes from the Greet work pentekostos which means "fiftieth". Exactly 50 days after Jesus rose from the dead, the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples in the form of flames of fire. The altar will be adorned with Red. Red is the power color and is appropriate for use on Pentecost as we remember the power and fire of "the Lord and Giver of Life," who revealed himself as the promised one. The color red communicates the motif of strength-strength and power the Holy Spirit gives in order for God's people to call on the name of Jesus Christ and share that powerful name with others.

Trinity Sunday-Confessing the **Holy Trinity.** And the History continues, from calendar.lcms.org The Athanasian Creed which was written by an anonymous author in the fifth century, is the Church's confession of the Holy Trinity. On Trinity Sunday, the Church proclaims the Christian faith through the words of the Athanasian Creed.

The Athanasian Creed declares that its teachings concerning the Holy trinity and our Lord's incarnation ae "the catholic faith." In other words, this is what the true Church of all times and places has confessed. More than 15 centuries later the Church continues to confess this truth, confident tha the triune God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit has given Himself for our Salvation.

The altar will be adorned with **white**, which is the color of **purity** and **completeness**. This color assists in bearing the message that "though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow." Christ's triumph from the grave on Resurrection Day is the cause for our rejoicing. His purity before his Father becomes our purity. White reinforces that message of joy.

The Power of Prayer! We thank everyone who participated in the April Weekly Bible discussion on Take My Life and Let it Be. As I listened to the discussion around the table I was inspired to thank Jesus of all the gifts in my life and try to find ways to use them to serve. I also really enjoy the Hymn we sang!.

May we continue to take a few minutes during fellowship to share our practices or traditions around Prayer? My New Year commitment was 3 things Scripture encourages me to do daily!
